he Deerfield Trail, just outside Blacksburg, is a short but pleasant hike on a flat, paved walkway. This out-and-back hike (0.8 miles one way) wanders through woods, along Tom's Creek and by open fields. There are informative signs describing the plant and animal life and several bluebird boxes adjacent to the trail. It is a good walk for bird and wildlife watching (see https://dwr.virginia.gov/vbwt/sites/Deerfield-trail) and

offers scenic views in all seasons. There are several benches along the trail including one where the trail crosses Tom's Creek—a nice lunch spot.

Access to the trail is about a mile northeast on Tom's Creek Rd. from the US 460 exit. There is available parking for at least six vehicles, more if you park on the side of the road. It is a wheelchair accessible site.

How to Vote in the November 2

Plection Day is Tuesday,
November 2, 2021. Virginia
allows voters to vote in-person
or by mail. Polls are open from 6 am
to 7 pm for in-person voting. The
procedures and instructions on how
to vote can be found on the Virginia
Department of Elections website



(<u>www.elections.virginia.gov</u>). Below is a summary to help you understand the requirements.

Registering to Vote

In order to cast a ballot in a Virginia election, you must be a registered voter. The voter eligibility requirements are listed on the "Registration" section of the elections website. In addition to being a Virginia resident, you must meet 5 other requirements. Eligible persons can find the procedures for registering to vote and where to do it in the "How to Register" section, which includes instructions for in-person and absentee registration. If you have moved since registering, you must update your address. Registration forms are available at Registrars' offices, DMV locations, public libraries, and on the website. The deadline for registering or updating your address for the November 2 election is Monday, October 11.

Absentee Voting

Absentee voting by mail and early in-person voting are options to casting an in-person ballot at a polling location on Election Day. The website section "Casting a Ballot" contains the information necessary for absentee and early voting.

Absentee voting by mail. Persons who want to vote by mail apply for an absentee ballot. No excuse is needed. You can apply at the Registrar's Office or at elections. virginia.gov. You must submit your application to the Registrar's office. Online, mail, fax, or email submittals by October 22. In-person submittals must be received by October 30. All online links and paper forms are accessible on the elections website. The registration form is a single page.

After the registrar processes your application, you will receive your ballot in the mail. Ballots are mailed out by the registrar starting on September 17 and must returned before 7 pm on Election Day or postmarked by November 2 if sent in by mail. You can also deposit your ballot in a Drop Box at the Registrar's office during business hours. A witness must sign your ballot envelope.

Early Voting in Person. You can vote early in person between September 17 and October 30. Montgomery County offers two locations. Elsewhere in the NRV, go to the county Registrar's Office (addresses below). All the sites offer Saturday voting Oct 23 and 30.

Both locations will also be open on Saturday, October 23 and Saturday, October 30, from 9-5.

Both locations will be closed on Columbus Day/Indigenous Peoples Day, October 11.

A Ballot Drop Box for absentee ballots will be available in the Registrars' offices during normal business hours. Ballot Drop-Boxes will also be available on Election Day, November 2, 2021 at each polling site.

The Department of Elections website is relatively easy to navigate and has all the links and forms necessary to cast your ballot. Voters should access the website directly to make sure you are following the complete and specific instructions from the Virginia Department of Elections.
