

Inaugural Co-Presidents' Message -- February, 2024

As we begin our presidency, the AARP Blacksburg Chapter remains a vibrant voice for healthy and successful aging in the NRV. The segment of the population, 65-85+, is growing rapidly in the US and locally and is expected to reach at least 80 million by 2040. Ironically, looking at demographics of Montgomery County, we note that the population of 65+ has grown at the fastest rate of any other segment between 2012 and 2022. The overall population of the county grew at a rate of .04% while the 65+ cohort grew at a rate of almost 5%. This rate of growth has huge implications for policy makers, planners, service providers and businesses in our community. One would expect this growth to sustain itself given the realities of the aging population base, the fact that the area is now promoting itself as a destination for retirees and the new phenomenon of grandparents trailing their grandchildren to support young families moving into the area. Unfortunately, the trend in Virginia and nationally shows AARP chapters shrinking at an alarming rate. To stay relevant, it is helpful to consider what successful chapters are doing well. We will share a few principles that drive that success as we consider our vision for the Blacksburg Chapter and our mission to maintain and grow our already successful chapter in 2024 and beyond.

One of the pillars of a successful chapter is that it establishes significant relationships with other community organizations. While interorganizational collaboration has always been a high priority of our chapter, we are excited about the seeds that have been planted by the Pathways to Successful Aging project that is exploring ways to improve communication among, and leverage the strengths of 15 community organizations that provide services and programs for our demographic. We believe that a healthy chapter should have consequential projects and activities that encourage member **involvement and benefit the community**. Three of the Chapter's most consequential activities include, first, the biennial Health and Wellness Fair. In 2022, under the leadership of Leslie Pendleton with the help of AARP Blacksburg and VCOM volunteers, among others, participants included 66 sponsors/exhibiters and approximately 120 visitors. Circle the date, September 18, on your calendar to discover the latest information about goods and services for supporting health and wellness in our community presented by the 80+ exhibitors. A second consequential, value-added activity of AARP Blacksburg is the Tax Aide program led by Pat Ballard that served 1178 clients during the past year. Third, the Chapter's ongoing efforts to increase its participation in food security projects is another example of the kind of vital work the Chapter values.

We believe a successful chapter must have regular meaningful meetings that provide social connection, cognitive engagement and programs that inform, entertain and challenge. The Chapter Program Committee, led by Wendy Baldwin and Pat Hipkins, are tireless in their strategic efforts to generate and deliver programs that make the monthly meeting "a happening" for the 25 or more members who attend. If you have not attended one before, give it a try, and come. Look at the list of upcoming programs in this Newsletter and join in.

We believe a successful chapter must **communicate regularly with its membership** by sharing timely and relevant information about Chapter and community activities, information that can enrich a member's life and provide news about people and important upcoming events in the community. This newsletter, published quarterly, is a great example of that kind of organic communication. The editors, Fred Piercy and Pam Knox have dedicated

themselves to helping the Chapter transition to an electronic format that is member friendly, informative and useful. The Mailchimp network, developed and coordinated by Don Creamer, is another timely way the Chapter communicates about issues and opportunities that may influence your life constructively.

The last part of the vision for a successful chapter is the need to **continually** add new members. New members bring fresh ideas and energy to carry on the good work of the chapter. They bring new vitality, social connections and friendships to the existing membership. Thirty new members joined last year through the efforts of the membership committee led by Wilma Dotson. The Chapter has felt their positive impact already. You can help as well by mentioning your connection to the Chapter to friends and acquaintances. Many people are familiar with the good work of the AARP at the national level through their advocacy, distribution of an incredible array of useful information related to aging and support of an extensive volunteer network. However, most people don't realize that there is a separate local chapter membership that can make their national membership even richer. Thus, if you have an opportunity to share an experience you had at a monthly meeting, or learned something useful from the chapter newsletter, pass it on to a friend and tell them where you got it. Word of mouth is the best recruitment tool we have.

Finally, we would be remiss if we ended our first column without extending our deep appreciation to Leslie Pendleton, our past president. Her three years of energetic and responsive leadership has left a lasting mark on the Chapter and the community.

AARP Memorial for Members Lost in 2023

Today we will be inspired by Clarence and Dudley, angels who pop up at Christmas time. Clarence was the angel who helps a compassionate but despairingly frustrated businessman named George Bailey in It's a Wonderful Life. In 1947, Dudley was a dashing angel played by Cary Grant in The Bishop's Wife and later, in a 1996 remake, played by Denzel Washington in The Preacher's Wife. In both films, Dudley assists a struggling spiritual leader with his faith. Now without any theological reasoning or research, just for today, let's believe there are angels like Clarence and Dudley, and our twelve good friends we remember today, who are watching over us.

Mary Devens passed away quietly on February 2. Mary was born and raised in the United States Army, daughter of a major general, served as an Army wife, and raised eight children – six of whom served as military officers. During her 39 years of military life, Mary crossed the Pacific Ocean six times in troop ships and moved on 26 occasions. In 1967, she and her husband Bud, moved to Blacksburg, when he accepted a position as Director of Engineering Fundamentals at Virginia Tech, and where she faithfully served St. Mary's Catholic Church and other organizations. Mary Devens rightfully deserves that final and traditional West Point farewell: "Well done. Be thou at peace." She was 93.

Donald Rude loved his family and friends, Shakespeare, opera, and anything that bloomed, especially irises, throughout his life until his death on March 4. His garden in Blacksburg is filled with over 400 different varieties of irises. For most of his distinguished career, Don served as a professor of English at Texas Tech University where he taught Shakespeare and other authors. He and his wife of 54 years, Carolyn, moved to Blacksburg in 2004 where he joined the faculty at Virginia Tech and continued to share his love for Shakespeare not only in the classroom, but through courses taught for seniors at the Blacksburg Community Center. Don was 86.

Siegfried Holzer was born in Austria, immigrated to the United States in 1956, and became a naturalized citizen in 1961. He passed away on March 22. Siegfried was a professor of engineering at Virginia Tech from 1972 to 2002 and was passionate about teaching and fostering an engaging learning environment. He received numerous accolades over the years, culminating in the Outstanding Faculty Award from the State Council of Higher Education. He loved nature and his time at his tree farm, as well as, in retirement, his daily trips to the Christiansburg Recreation Center for exercising and socializing. Siegfried was 86.

Archie Phlegar passed away peacefully on March 30. He attended Virginia Polytechnic Institute in 1948, enrolled as a member of the Corps of Cadets and played corpet in the Highty Tighties. After conving his country in the Air Force

during the Korean War, he used his Engineering degree to work with the Appalachian Power Company. He accepted a position in the admissions office at Virginia Tech ultimately earning a PhD there serving as the Director of Admissions until his retirement. He loved all sorts of woodworking, especially making beautiful furniture, and built almost every home he lived in, even his beloved Claytor Lake home. Archie was 92.

George Flick, Jr. died on June 3. After earning three degrees from Louisiana State University, he was employed by Virginia Tech in 1969 and retired in 2010 with the rank of University Distinguished Professor. George was the recipient of many professional honors and awards and was elected to the Virginia Tech College of Agriculture and Life Sciences Alumni Hall of Fame. He was a Cub Scout leader, youth soccer coach, President of the University Club and a member of the Knights of Columbus and the American Legion. George was 83.

Howard Moses passed away on August 8. He was a life-long student, holding a degree in Electrical Engineering and an master's in business administration. After retiring from his industry career as Vice-President of Engineering and Research for major aerospace corporations, he became the Technical Director for the NSF-Sponsored Center for Power Electronic Systems at Virginia Tech. He retired again but a few months later was fully engaged with a company in the Corporate Research Center developing software tools for the aerospace industry. When Howard finally retired at 79, he thoroughly enjoyed group chat coffee and donut sessions, especially when they were centered on airplanes and US military history. Howard was 87.

Nancy Wolfe passed away on August 12. Hailing from central Pennsylvania, Nancy's journey of caregiving began when she discovered her passion for nursing during her college years. Her dedication to her nursing profession continued to shine as she worked at Virginia Tech Student Health, where she cared for countless college students. She and James, her high school sweetheart, had moved to Blacksburg, Virginia in 1965 where their passion for their community extended to their love for Virginia Tech athletics, becoming devoted Hokies and enthusiastically supporting their teams for over five decades. Nancy's legacy is one of love, compassion, and care — an inspiration

to all who were blessed to know her. She was 86.

Richard Saacke died peacefully surrounded by family at home on August 20. Dick expressed deep gratitude for his vocation as a professor of reproductive physiology at Virginia Tech where he interfaced with outstanding scientists, students and friends throughout the Commonwealth, nation, and the world. He was grateful for the College of Agriculture and Life Sciences and the Department of Dairy Science where he was able to teach and research the biology of reproduction in farm animals in a creative, productive, and friendly environment. Dick served in the US Army Signal Corp and credited it for many lessons learned, including appreciation for his country and for those who gave their lives in preserving freedoms. Dick was 91.

Jean Darby passed away peacefully on October 14. She was an avid reader, starting each day with her Bible and coffee. She proudly earned her bachelor's degree while raising four children and retired from the U.S. Department of Commerce. Jean and her husband Gerald were life-long learners, participating in and supporting the Learning in Retirement Institute at George Mason University and attending Elderhostel (now Road Scholar) events throughout the country. They settled in Blacksburg Warm Hearth Village and enjoyed many activities and friendships made there. Jean was 90.

James Montgomery, retired attorney, Major General and Virginia Tech administrator, passed away in his Blacksburg home on October 24. After earning his PhD from Columbia University, Jim started his career in university administration, pioneering the field of Institutional Research and Planning. In addition to his academic career, Jim remained in the Army Reserves for 36 years. After retirement from Virginia Tech, Jim earned his law degree and worked for 27 years as an attorney. His volunteer activities were numerous, including service on the Boards of the Virginia Tech YMCA, the Agency on Aging, the Blacksburg Chapter of the AARP, and the Blacksburg United Methodist Church. Jim was 93.

James Wightman died peacefully at Roanoke Memorial Hospital on November 20. In 1962, Jim joined the faculty in the chemistry department at Virginia Tech, where he taught courses, guided graduate students and conducted research in

the field of adhesive science for 42 years. Among numerous awards, Jim received the Alumni Distinguished Professor Award for excellence in teaching. He loved providing fun educational experiences for his family, whether it was sharing all the joys that the Chesapeake Bay offered or serving as a guest chemistry lecturer at his grandkids' schools conducting experiments with helium and other gasses, putting out a fire with earwax or making liquid nitrogen ice cream. Jim was 88.

And last, **Mildred Wiggert** died on December 12. She received her Bachelor of Arts in education from the University of Michigan and later received her Master of Arts in Elementary Education from Virginia Tech. Millie taught at Harding Avenue Elementary School for many years and was active with the Montgomery County Education Association. In a funeral tribute, one parent wrote, ""Miss Wiggert", as my two sons called her, was an awesome teacher. Her special way of giving each child individual attention was much appreciated. "Others wrote of her many outdoor interests, skill with pets, and the twinkle in her eye. Millie was 92.

The American country music band *Alabama* had a popular song a few years ago called, "Angels Among Us". The lyrics could apply to angels Clarence and Dudley...and maybe our dear friends...who knows?

"They wear so many faces, show up in the strangest places, to grace us with their mercy in our time of need... They come to you and me in our darkest hours. To show us how to live, to teach us how to give, and to guide us with the light of love."

Thank you, twelve dear friends and colleagues, for your guidance during your long and lovely lives....and if, as angels, you are to grace us with your love as well, we'll be most appreciative.




Fred Piercy

Pat's Baked Pineapple Bread Pudding

Here is Pat Hipkins' recipe for a good but simple holiday side dish that pairs especially well with ham.

<u>Ingredients:</u>

- ½ cup butter, softened
- 1 cup sugar
- 4 eggs
- 1 #2 (20-oz) can crushed pineapple, well drained
- 5 slices of white bread, cubed

(Using five center loaf slices of Portuguese Sweet Bread from Our Daily Bread is especially good!)

Crisco or butter for greasing baking dish

- . .

Optional:

~ 1/4 - 1/2 cup golden raisins and/or chopped pecans

Instructions:

- Preheat oven to 350°.
- Grease a 1½ 2 quart casserole dish.
- Cream together butter and sugar.
- Add eggs, one at a time, and beat well.
- Add pineapple (and raisins and nuts, if used) and mix.
- · Gently fold/stir in bread crumbs.
- Put mixture into the greased casserole dish.
- Bake, uncovered, until lightly browned = 45 minutes to 1 hour.

Serve hot or cold.

Simply Limeade Margarita

Fred Piercy says that this recipe is both easy and tasty. If you want more or less of any ingredient, Fred says, "Go for it."

- 4 parts Simply Limeade (from Kroger or Food Lion)
- 2 parts tequila
- 1 part triple sec
